## <u>Total Knee Replacement</u> Post-Operative Patient Information

At the time your surgery is booked some preoperative tests will be arranged. It is usual for patients to attend the pre-admission clinic at Calvary Hospital where preoperative checks and an ECG are attended. If there are any detected problems these will be sorted out prior to surgery. In general, patients are admitted on the day of their surgery. It would be reasonable to expect discharge on approximately day 4 to day 7.

On the day of your surgery you will return to the ward from the operating theatre. There will be dressings on your knee. There will be a drainage tube coming from the wound. A urinary catheter may have been utilised. Elastic stockings will also be applied to both your legs to attempt to reduce the risk of deep venous thrombosis.

Patients are mobilised on the night of the surgery and certainly by the 1st post-operative day. On the 1st post-operative day the drain exiting the wound and any urinary catheters will be removed. The dressings generally stay intact for the first few days. Physiotherapy will commence immediately on the ward following surgery. X-rays and post-operative bloods are attended on day 2. Once you are safe with or without the use of crutches or walking aides you will be discharged from Calvary Hospital. An appointment will be made to see Dr Howard in approximately 6 weeks.

It is generally hoped that compression stockings on your legs will be used for 6 weeks. Once you have leg control it is possible to drive. This is generally around about the 5-6 week mark. Regular mobility is encouraged.
